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Benign Squamous Papilloma of the Vulva

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
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The benign squamous papilloma of the vulva is a rare skin condition. It is often considered a skin tag variant. Our case is an 18-year-old female who presented to the outpatient department with a slow-growing painless vulvar growth for the past 6 years. It was located on labium majus, $10\times7cm$ in size, soft, mobile, non-tender, pedunculated, and irregular in shape and growth. Her basic investigations are Hemoglobin 11.2 gm%, hematocrit 33%, MCV 80 μm 3, urinalysis within normal limits, HIV & HbsAg negative. An excision biopsy was done for esthetic reasons. The histopathology report revealed acanthotic epithelium, hyperkeratosis, and papillary projections

with the fibrovascular core. Her postoperative recovery was uneventful. She presented at one monthly follow-up with sound healing. We bring forward this case as it is one of the uncommon benign masses of the vulva.

Final Diagnosis

Benign squamous papilloma of the vulva.

Three Differential Diagnosis

Achrocordon, Genital warts, Lipoma.

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
